As you know, 2016 was a landmark year for Hope for Tomorrow as we were awarded the Queen’s Award for Enterprise in the category of Innovation. 2017 promises to be just as special as we celebrate 10 years since we launched the world’s first Mobile Chemotherapy Unit (MCU) in Gloucestershire. This landmark is one we are immensely proud of and drives us forward to ensure we continue to bring cancer care closer to even more patients long into the future.

Since the launch of the first MCU back in 2007 we have learned a lot about cancer care and the provision and operation of specialist mobile units around the country. We have an in-depth understanding of the needs of NHS Oncology Departments, their patients and staff and we want to invest in the continued development and sustainability of our existing fleet, expand further across the UK and to develop additional innovations to improve access for patients irrespective of age and treatment type.

When we launched the world’s first Mobile Chemotherapy Unit (MCU) back in 2007 it was prior to the government adopting its ‘care in the community’ policy.

We develop, build, own and maintain the MCUs and provide them to the NHS to operate. After the successful 3 year pilot scheme for our first MCU we have gone on to launch a total of 11 across the country with ambitions to have 20 MCUs by 2022. In July 2017, we will be launching our next new unit in partnership with The Royal Marsden NHS Foundation Trust – a landmark moment for the charity working in partnership with such a recognised leader in cancer treatment.

We are not only celebrating 10 years on the road; it’s about expertise in our field of operation. We don’t just own and maintain, we work closely with our potential NHS Partners to take them from their initial interest through to delivery of a MCU. This involves working with many different internal NHS departments who will all have “to buy into” the MCU project. From the Pharmacist to the Facilities Manager it is a team effort from start to finish.



Develop

Bringing an NHS partner into our project can take many months, sometimes years of negotiation and liaison. For example it took 6 years to bring our East Essex MCU to launch. Jo Tonkin, the Medical Project Lead and Head of Nursing and Clinical Services sums up the complexity of the process perfectly:

"Working in partnership with Hope for Tomorrow we were able to produce a business case that articulated clearly the benefit to patients and the organisation. Following approval the real team work began. Developing an MCU with the spec that matched the requirements of the trusts infection control team and clinical service was never too much trouble. Developing a bespoke MCU fit for our purpose but based upon the experience shared from organisations that had gone before us led to the delivery in July last year of 'Maureen', Colchester's own MCU. The work involved leading up to 'Maureen's' delivery was no mean feat. Identifying sites for the MCU, staffing requirements, recruitment of drivers and writing the operational policies required to ensure our service was safe and fit for purpose once on the

road was a challenge and not without its issues. However my constant emails with questions and queries to the Hope for Tomorrow team were always dealt with promptly and provided reassurance and suggestions about how to move forward.

The Colchester team view this partnership very positively. It's provided our patients with the opportunity to receive their treatment closer to their homes in an environment that is fit for purpose and by staff they have built a relationship with and they know and trust."



Build

Our coach builders are specialists in their field and they ensure our MCUs are fit for purpose for the needs of the NHS not only for the here and now but for future developments in the field of chemotherapy and other cancer related treatments. Each MCU is bespoke built onto a chassis and is designed to give patients the same quality of treatment experience as they would expect in the hospital itself.



Maintain

Each MCU is serviced every 12 weeks with ongoing maintenance and repairs ranging from air conditioning unit filters, window and flooring seals, electrical upgrades and general repairs – with each

MCU at a different stage of its lifecycle there is an ongoing schedule that we have to carefully project manage which also includes our fleet of Nurses Support Vehicles.



Coming soon our next MCU

We are proud to announce that our next MCU will be launched in partnership with The Royal Marsden NHS Foundation Trust. This renowned specialist cancer treatment hospital is based in London and operates across two sites; one in Chelsea and one in Sutton, Surrey, where our MCU will be based. The MCU is set to launch in July 2017 with potential treatment locations to be confirmed nearer to the launch date.

The Royal Marsden Cancer Charity is funding two drivers who will be responsible for safely delivering the MCU to treatment locations and returning to its base at the end of clinics.

This MCU is the sixth MCU funded by The Mark Benevolent Fund. On behalf of all the patients this MCU will help, we are so grateful for their support.

Gloucestershire New Unit Appeal Success

After a successful appeal, and to mark the 10th anniversary of our Mobile Chemotherapy Units, we presented Gloucestershire NHS Foundations Trust with a brand new Generation Two MCU;

'Helen', enabling us to continue to bring cancer care closer to patients' homes. 'Helen' was a dear friend of our charity founder, who sadly passed away from cancer.

Since the launch in 2007, 'Helen' has saved patients 54,000 hours of waiting time and over 720,000 miles.

Many donated towards this appeal by a tremendous amount of fundraising for which we are incredibly grateful. We would also like to

take a moment to thank The Swire Charitable Trust who made a very generous donation, which completed the appeal and to the Duchess of Beaufort who attended the launch and cut the ribbon for us to officially open the MCU.



Reserve MCU

As we now have MCUs on the road across the country, we utilise two reserve MCUs in order to ensure continuity of service for patients. With our ongoing maintenance programme, we never want patients to miss out on cancer care closer to home and by running and providing these reserve MCUs, we are able to provide our NHS Partners with a vehicle whilst theirs is in for maintenance and/ or repairs to make sure they can still operate their service. 'Teddy' is pictured here with one of the East Kent drivers on its recent visit to the county.



Teddy is named after our Patron, Ross Browns' mother 'Teddy' who sadly passed away from cancer.

Lincolnshire Update

We are pleased to announce that our Lincolnshire MCU 'Elaine' now visits Louth once a week helping to bring cancer care closer to patients' homes.

'Elaine' visits 3 locations weekly; Grantham, Skegness and Louth. We recently celebrated her 3rd Birthday as a thank you for all the support since her launch back in 2014. 'Elaine' has so far saved patients over 120,000 miles of travel and 10,000 hours of their time.



East Essex Update

Since our East Essex MCU, named 'Maureen' launched last summer, she has been busy administering over 600 treatments to patients in Tiptree, Clacton, Halstead and Stanway. We have received countless letters of thanks and donations from patients who have been so appreciative of the service 'Maureen' provides.

In Colchester there has been a steady growth of patients utilizing the services, which include administration of oral and intravenous chemotherapy, PICC line care, pre-chemotherapy blood tests and other supportive treatments.

Evaluating the service after six months and evidencing the patient experience is paramount. Patients who have used the MCU over this time period were sent a questionnaire to gauge feedback on the convenience of the service and whether this has improved their experience of receiving chemotherapy/supportive care away from the hospital setting.

"Much less stressful – can be fitted into a morning easily leaving me time to shop and do other things afterwards. The driving is minimal too. The atmosphere in the bus is calm and I enjoy pleasant conversations with the nurses and other patients."

Nettie Percival

How long have you worked on the MCU and what is your role within the team?

I worked on the MCU for 18 months from its inception as one of the deputy sisters. I have since taken up a full time post as deputy sister on the Outpatient unit so I am still on the periphery of the project while helping the new nurse in post and enjoy the rare occasions where I am back on shift on the MCU.

What do you like about being involved in the MCU project?

The difference it makes to the patient is tremendous. Having time to provide a holistic service is the crux of nursing philosophy. The satisfaction of treating a patient on time, nearer to their home and being able to reduce the burden of the patients cancer journey is tremendous.

What does the MCU give patients and nursing staff?

For the patient it reduces the burden of cancer, bringing chemotherapy closer to home helps to alleviate the stress of the journey, how to get there, who will take them, where to park, travelling any distance while feeling the effects of treatment, the financial cost of travel but most of all it reduces all the delays and time spent away from home. This is really important for patients. For staff, having time to care is the most important aspect of nursing care and the satisfaction of making a difference.

Take us through your work with the MCU project...

I set up the MCU with equipment, organised training for the drivers, was involved in the operational policy and action cards and carried out risk assessments of the MCU to ensure patients and staff safety. I educated staff on the background of the MCU, set up a database to audit attendance, tumour groups, and where the patients travel from. I ensured that staff had completed ILS training and completed all the relevant documents to drive the support vehicle and arranged for the checking and calibrating of equipment. I looked at the suitability of the proposed sites and negotiated with the fleet services manager to ensure the correct electrical supplies were in place, formulated time lines to work out operational hours and drivers rosters. I attended meetings to update Hope for Tomorrow regarding progress of the MCU and in-house meetings involving consultants and pharmacists to decide on the approved regimens. I completed quarterly reports and fortnightly returns and organised computers, telephone and Wi-Fi access for the MCU.

How have you seen the MCU benefit patients?

I have seen face to face the benefit for the patient; they are more independent, in control of what is happening to them, spend less time in hospital and don't have to worry about transport and the additional costs entailed. It is more personal and the patients like that personal touch and the time to talk. Patients are happier and more relaxed whilst on the MCU.

Stand out moment

One of our patients used to cycle to the MCU, even when he wasn't due for treatment, to drop off doughnuts for staff. He was eternally grateful to us for the service we offered.

Over the next 5 years we will not only be launching new MCUs but we will also be undertaking a replacement body programme for the older MCUs in our fleet. In addition we need to replace ageing Nurses Support Vehicles.

- Each new MCU costs the charity **£265,000** to develop, build and maintain for a 4 year period
- Each replacement MCU body will cost the charity **£150,000**
- Each replacement NSV will cost the charity **£12,500** for a 4 year period
