Berkshire ~ new MCU

We have great pleasure in announcing that our 6th Mobile Chemotherapy Unit will launch in early 2014, and will be operated by the Royal Berkshire NHS Foundation Trust.

The Unit will operate out of the Royal Berkshire Hospital in Reading with treatment locations to be confirmed shortly.

As with our other Units, the Berkshire Mobile Chemotherapy Unit is owned and maintained by Hope for Tomorrow.

Eask Kent Launch

On Monday 14th October, we proudly launched our fifth Mobile Chemotherapy Unit in East Kent, generously supported by ICAP. The latest MCU to join our fleet will service Hythe and other remote parts of the county.

The launch took place at the Kent County Cricket Club in Canterbury and was attended by a range of medical representatives.

The Unit has been named 'Caron', in memory of Gloria Hunniford's daughter Caron Keating, who sadly passed away from cancer. Gloria's son Michael came to cut the ribbon along with local patient Peter Laker MBE, who has undergone chemotherapy himself.

Mr Laker, from Chartham near Canterbury, said it would provide a lifeline to people in their "darkest hour".

'Cancer diagnosis comes like a bolt out of the blue, and chemotherapy hits you hard. It makes you feel down and depressed. I started my treatment during one of the worst winters, when we had eight inches of snow. This unit will benefit people who can't get to hospital for treatment."

Southampton

In the coming months we will be piloting a new project in Southampton. The NHS team at University Hospital Southampton currently offer outreach services at local hospices. However, they've had some problems transporting the nurses and drugs, and currently use taxis. To help them continue to bring cancer treatment closer to patient's homes, we will be providing them with a Nurses Support Vehicle.

Keeping the wheels moving

Regular Giving

With our fleet of Mobile Chemotherapy Units growing, and with increasing demand, we are appealing for help to keep them on the road. Giving a gift on a regular basis is one of the best ways in which you can support our work. It's simple to set up, and the payments are collected automatically, which cuts down on administration costs.

After the launch costs, each Mobile Chemotherpay Unit requires \pm 12,000 to keep it maintained on a yearly basis. If all of our current supporters gave just \pm 2 a month, we would raise enough money to fund the maintenance of each operational Mobile Chemotherapy Unit.

How to sign up... it is easier than most people think to set up a regular gift. You can either notify your bank directly or you can log onto our website, click on the yellow 'Donate' button in the top right-hand side of our website and follow the instructions.

"I've just passed the two year mark after my cancer and chemotherapy and have been told it's far less likely to recur now. Since I will be moving from Gloucester to Oakridge next year, I feel personally how beneficial this service must be to folks living in rural communities. I tried to imagine getting to hospital from Oakridge for regular treatment and realised it would not be much fun, especially in Winter. I hope neither my wife nor I ever need it, but I'm happy to give a little regularly in support."

Making a regular donation towards our Mobile Chemotherapy project means that patients, like Hilary May (pictured), can continue receiving chemotherapy closer to home. Hilary had to travel all of 1 mile, instead of the usual 26 miles, whilst she was undergoing treatment on our MCU and was in fact the first person to use our Somerset Unit 'Bumble'.



Payroll & Pension Giving

The Government has recently tried to make it easier for UK citizens to donate to charities on a monthly basis. Payroll Giving is a scheme that enables employees to give to any UK charity straight from their gross salary before tax is deducted.

You pay tax at the basic rate of 20% and make a monthly donation of \pm 10. That means you save \pm 2 tax (20% of \pm 10). The actual cost of the donation to you is \pm 8.

Our nominated Payroll Giving company is Payroll Giving in Action, which is a professional fundraising organisation whose primary aim is to raise awareness and take up of the pre-tax Payroll Giving scheme.

I am responsible for supporting the trained nurse in the administration of chemotherapy and supportive treatments and preparing equipment and patients for treatment on board Bumble.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

I like to do computer design and programming, building networks and systems and of course my games! I enjoy my voluntary work within St John Ambulance giving much needed first aid support to my local community, and also helping the NHS ambulance service during times of great need, such as the tragic M5 incident and the recent weather we've had.



What do you think about the Mobile Chemotherapy Unit service?

I have to say, before joining the MCU team I had never heard of it, but I am so glad to be a part of it. It is so nice to see patients happy that they can be treated much closer to home.

Without Hope for Tomorrow, patients who would otherwise be too unwell to travel to their appointments have the opportunity to receive their treatments. The charity itself does so much for people with cancer and I don't think treatments today would be the same if it wasn't for you guys.
